The owner of Fibrecrete Pools, has put up his hand many times over the past few years to assist the Sanctuary in their construction of their wildlife exhibits.

Mr Bath has just finished work on a new wombat enclosure which offers visitors a very up-close-and-personal look at these mammals which are currently listed as endangered.

"I think of the Sanctuary as my place and I want to be sure that it will still be here tomorrow — as sure as the sun will rise," Mr Barth said.

"I enjoy visiting the Sanctuary with my kids and I believe it is important to educate them on why we all need to make a contribution to ensure our wildlife and the environment will still be here for families in the future."

The wombat enclosure is being completely renovated and expanded to incorporate more wombats, and Fibrecrete Pools has previously worked on the Tasmanian devil, baby crocodile and dingo enclosures, as well as the raptor rehab facility.
